WELGOME FROM THE EXECUTIVE OFFICER



Dr Deb Hull HTAV Executive Officer

A theme like 'Changing the Course of History' has scope for such a wide range of interpretations.

There is the release this year of the new Victorian F–10 Curriculum, which will literally 'change the History course'. While much of it will be recognisable, Victoria's response to the new Australian Curriculum will result in new opportunities for History teachers and students. As these emerge, we will clearly see the value of engaging with change as a state-wide, cross-sectoral History teaching community.

Then there are the world events that are clearly 'changing the course of History' as we watch: the release of generative AI, the resurgence of wars and conflicts with long histories, and the open challenges to democracy in countries where it seemed entrenched. On the other hand, the world has a growing understanding of the impacts of environmental damage, health breakthroughs are leading to longer average lifespans than humans have ever known, and violence against women, trans people and non-binary people is no longer considered a 'private matter' in Australia's legal and political circles.

But these are all very large matters. Each of us is 'changing the course of history' in our small way every day. The choices we make when we vote, volunteer, parent, purchase, develop future leaders and citizens, and equip them with knowledge of the way people have behaved in the past—these daily choices are also influencing the future.

I hope you will join us at the Annual Conference, and I hope the learning, support, energy and connections you find there will 'change the course of your history', even just a little.

EMERITUS PROFESSOR PETER MCPHEE AM, HTAV PATRON

(The University of Melbourne)
Peter McPhee AM has been a supporter of History teachers and their students since travelling on one of the first History Safaris through regional Victoria as a PhD student in the 1970s. Since then, he has often spoken at HTAV conferences and at HTAV student lectures. His view is that we cannot overestimate the civic



and workplace importance of an education in History, which emphasises careful use of evidence, cultural understanding, flexibility of outlook, and respect for difference. He argues that our History teachers deserve the place in the school curriculum that the HTAV advocates.

Peter was appointed to a Personal Chair in History at the University of Melbourne in 1993. He has published widely on the history of modern France, most recently Robespierre: A Revolutionary Life (Yale University Press, 2012) and Liberty or Death: The French Revolution (Yale University Press, 2016). He was President of the Academic Board in 2002–2003, then appointed to the position of Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic) in 2003, before becoming the university's first Provost in 2007-2009, with responsibility for the design and implementation of the university's new curriculum structures, the Melbourne Model. He chaired the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority in 2007-2009 and chaired the Board of Melbourne University Publishing in 2012–2017. He was elected a Fellow of the Australian Academy of the Humanities in 1997, and of the Academy of the Social Sciences in 2003. He was awarded a Centenary Medal for services to education in 2003 and became a Member of the Order of Australia in 2012.

Peter continued teaching undergraduates about the history of the French Revolution, among other things, across a 50-year university teaching career. He is currently the Chair of the History Council of Victoria, the state's peak body for History. Its vision is to connect Victorians with history and to inspire engagement with the past, their identity and the world today. The History Council delivers the History Roadshow, the successor to the History Safaris of the 1970s, which seeks to support the work of the HTAV and its members by providing content-enrichment lectures to VCE students by academic historians.



Moving Beyond Truth-telling to Justice in the Australian History Classroom Dr Aleryk Fricker, Deakin University The process of truth-telling in the History classroom has become more prominent in recent times. This has largely been driven by History teachers from a revisionist perspective, seeking to explore the untold histories of the forgotten people as a direct response to the 'great men of history' mentality that has dominated History classrooms for much of the eighteenth, nineteenth and twentieth centuries. In the Australian context, this has contributed to an increase in the amount of First Nations content but also the troubling nature of the content being covered. Truth-telling has undoubtably had an impact on the History classroom, but possibly not in the ways it was hoped. This keynote explores the process of truth-telling and reconciliation, its limitations, and how the History classroom can move beyond historical truth-telling and into just History.

SESSION	I've studied the 'history wars' for 20 years, so I know how Australian history has been revised and reinterpreted by successive generations. Each iteration of Australia's national story reveals not only the past in question, but also the guiding concerns and perceptions of each generation of history makers. Surprisingly, when I wrote Making Australian History there had been no account of the ways it has changed, who makes history, and how. That was my starting point for the book.						
	But when it came to writing, it seemed there were more questions than answers: Where does Australian history even begin? With Deep Time? With those early colonial accounts of New Holland? And who are Australia's historians?						
	History making has taken place in what we now call Australia for thousands of generations, but the History discipline has also been part of the architecture of its colonisation, policing whose stories can be told and by whom. We also know that history can play a vital role in truth-telling and reconciliation, as the Uluru Statement from the Heart has advocated. I wrote this book because I wanted to tell the story of 'Australian history'—with all its messiness and possibility.





Conveniently located adjacent to the Queen Victoria Market and an easy walk from Melbourne Central Station, the Jasper Hotel is very easy to access.

GETTING THERE

TRAM

Trams run along Elizabeth Street and Victoria Street. Stops are located less than five minutes' walk to the venue.

TRAIN

The venue is a five-minute walk from Melbourne Central Station via the Elizabeth Street exit.

CAR

Hotel Parking: Car parking is not available onsite at Jasper Hotel. However, the Jasper Hotel has formed a partnership with Queen Victoria Market Undercover Car Park.

Queen Victoria Market Undercover Parking – Conference/Hotel Guests Special Rates

456 Queen Street, Queen Victoria Market – Undercover Car Park Levels B3 and B4 only

To access the special parking rates, conference attendees and hotel guests must park on Levels B3 or B4 only.

Collect a parking voucher from Jasper Hotel reception to access one of the following discounted rates:

- Conference attendees \$25 per day for conference guests from 7.00 am to 7.00 pm
- Short term \$29 per day for hotel guests from 11.00 am to 12.00 pm (following day)
- Long term \$24 per day for hotel guests only (+7 day) from 11.00 am to 12.00 pm

No parking ticket is required upon entering the car park, as licence plate recognition is used. To exit the car park, scan the parking voucher provided by the hotel. There are three ways to access the Queen Victoria Market Undercover Car Park, located at 456 Queen Street:

- From Peel Street, turn left into Franklin Street, at the roundabout take the first exit and head north along Queen Street.
- From Elizabeth Street, turn into Franklin Street, at the roundabout take the third exit and head north along Queen Street.
- From Queen Street, at the roundabout take the second exit and head north along Queen Street.

Queen Victoria Market Parking – Open Air








Launching at the 2024 HTAV Annual Conference
